Student Identification

- Summer Matters programs are open to **ALL current TK-12** students enrolled in SCUSD
- Site Designed Academic Program (SDAP):
 - Sites will submit a proposal and students will be pre-identified by site
- Credit Recovery (CR) open to all HS students
 - High School Students are **identified by counselors** and encouraged to participate in online credit recovery and in-person options to meet graduation and **A-G requirements**
 - **Priority is given to credit deficient seniors**
- ESY students are determined through the IEP process

What to Consider at the IEP Meeting

- What shall the IEP Team Consider?
 - Nature and severity of a student's disability
 - Regression and Recoupment
 - Degree of progress towards IEP goals and objectives
 - Emerging skills/breakthrough opportunities
 - Interfering behavior
 - Special circumstances that interfere with a student's ability to benefit from special education
 - All the appropriate data

Hold an IEP Meeting

- Who determines ESY?
 - IEP Team:
 - Parents/Guardians
 - Administrative Designee
 - General Education Teacher
 - Special Education Teacher
 - Service Providers
 - Student (if appropriate)
 - Other?
- When to determine ESY?
 - Plan Review
 - Eligibility Evaluation
 - Amendment

ESY Eligibility

- ESY must be considered for all individuals who are eligible under IDEA.
- Services are to be provided to students who:
 - Need to maintain critical life skills because they are at risk of losing those skills
 - Are exhibiting emerging skills which may be lost over school breaks
 - Will experience significant regression/recoupment of previously learned skills without the provision of such services.

Regression & Recoupment

- Research shows that regression and recoupment occur in all students and will vary across skills, people, and circumstances.
- A student is eligible for ESY when the period of review or reteaching required to recoup the skill or knowledge level attained by the end of the prior school year is beyond the time ordinarily reserved for that purpose at the beginning of the school year.
- “The typical period of review or reteaching ranges between 20 and 40 school days. As a guideline for determining eligibility for an extended school year program, a review period of eight weeks or more would indicate that substantial regression has occurred.”

Method for Collecting Data

1. To gather regression/recoupment data, service providers may consider the following methods:
2. Identify the skill to be measured and the tool to measure the skill.
3. Collect data for the student with an IEP and a peer using the measurement tool within the last 1-2 weeks of the school year and after the first 6-8 weeks of school in the following school year. Or any break during the school year of 5 days or more (e.g. Winter break, Spring Break)
4. Compare the data considering the amount of progress made by both students. You may need to collect data a third time to evaluate the rate of recoupment.

ESY Factors to Consider

- **What it is:**
 - ESY services may be needed or vary from student to student, but the end result is that some students may suffer **severe losses** of social, behavioral , communication, academic, or **self-sufficiency skills during** interruptions in instruction that **they cannot regain within a reasonable time.**
- **What it is not:**
 - Students shall not be found eligible in the following circumstances:
 - The family needs child care.
 - **Amount of time** before school is back in session - because there is a three month summer break, this does not warrant ESY
 - The student will make more progress.
 - The student is not at grade level.

ESY Factors to Consider

LRE Defined:

- LRE refers to the setting where a child with a disability can receive an appropriate education designed to meet his or her educational needs, alongside peers without disabilities to the maximum extent appropriate.

ESY Factors to Consider

Level of Service & Support;

- Current services and supports should not be increased for ESY only.
 - If the student needs more support, that support should be provided during the school year before considering ESY.
- Students shall not have a different placement for ESY. Change of placement IEPs, to a more restrictive placement should involve a full IEP team and not only changed for ESY
- A full day ESY schedule replicates **an SDC setting**.

ESY vs. Other

- **Credit Recovery**
 - Program option available to high school students who are on diploma track and did not receiving passing marks to obtain credit for the course. _

Extended School Year (ESY) vs. Other

- **ESY**
 - Extended School Year (ESY) is a special education and related service that is considered when offering an individual with exceptional needs an offer of a free and appropriate public education (FAPE).
- **Summer School**
 - Summer school is a function of general education programming. As a result, participation in summer school is not determined by a special education student's IEP.
